

# Memoranda of Understanding are formalized with key partners along the legume value chains in the impact zones

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## **N2Africa**

Putting nitrogen fixation to work for smallholder farmers in Africa

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#### 1 Introduction

The project has developed numerous Memoranda of Understanding (MoUs) with partners in the specific impact zones. There are a total of 40 partners in seven of the Countries that have signed MoUs and are implementing work in Delivery and Dissemination (D&D), Agronomy, Rhizobiology and Baseline activities (excluding Mozambique). Mozambique has been collaborating with IIAM on Agronomy, TechnoServe on D&D and no partner on Rhizobiology but at this time no MoUs have been signed. The majority of the agronomy work in Mozambique is implemented by IITA. The list of partners in the respective countries with their main area of work is shown below. Twenty-eight of the 40 partners are engaged in D&D with an average of about four partners in each Country. In most countries each D&D partner is responsible for D&D in a specific area of the country. Three countries have one partner doing all the agronomy work, In Nigeria one partner is responsible for the Sudan savannah and the other is responsible for Northern Guinea savannah while in DR Congo and Kenya TSBF-CIAT is doing the work. All seven Countries have one partner responsible for all the Rhizobiology work. In three of the Countries (Nigeria, Ghana and Malawi) MoUs were developed to do the Baseline Study and in five of the Countries there were contracts with individuals to do the work.

The majority of the partnerships developed in the seven Countries have been successful. The evidence for this is in the progress that N2Africa is making on the milestones. The projects milestone reports and other documents on the N2Africa website can be reviewed for more specific information. One weakness that has been noted is that most reports do not clearly state the partners that are responsible for the progress in the project and only demonstrate that the project has achieved the milestone.

#### 3 Challenges and lessons learned

- I. Delay in signing of MoUs hence delay in disbursement of funds. The two main lessons learned were that formal discussions need to be started early and must include the people that have responsibility for approving MoUs.
- II. Delay in submission of reports by partners leading to a delay in disbursement of funds which are pegged to reports as deliverables. Some partners have little or no experience with preparing technical and/or financial reports. N2Africa has responded by having IITA and CIAT visit the staff of partners and train them on the appropriate financial management and financial reporting procedures. Where partners have difficulties preparing technical reports N2Africa has been helping them edit reports so the partners can learn through experience.
- III. Inadequate capacity to carry out the work due to involvement in several other development and research projects. Partners are therefore over-burdened and tend to have divided attention, leading to inadequate supervision of the task they agree to do for the project. The response to this situation has been to reduce the budget and responsibilities of over-burdened partners. Also, as we engage with new partners we try to evaluate the work they are presently engaged in and with their active engagement evaluate how much additional responsibilities they can handle.
- IV. Potential partner's unwillingness to sign agreements. We have not found a solution to this situation and it may not be a major problem. Probably the main causes of this is the potential partner is already fully engaged with other projects and does not want to be over extended by adding another project and/or they may not agree with the terms and conditions being offered by N2Africa. In most situations when a potential partner decides not to have an MoU with N2Africa it is the right decision.
